"And So, What If He Is Insane? Are There No Asylums?: The State and the Insane in the Late Ottoman Empire"

The second half of the nineteenth century in the Ottoman Empire witnessed a state-orchestrated initiative to bring the insane under medico-political control. Through this process, insanity was stripped off its popular attributes and formularized as a new type of malady—one that could only be treated in a new and specially designed institution called bîmârhâne (mental asylum). Analogous to the new conception of insanity and subsequent official formulations, the mentally ill were identified as a distinct category in official correspondence, laws and regulations, and their existence in public places was no longer tolerated. In later periods, they would be relegated to purpose-built institutions that were expected to reform their conditions. In the present talk, I will explore these state undertakings to define, control and reform the conditions of the mentally ill in the nineteenth-century Ottoman Empire.
