

The Holocaust in Hungary in Comparative Perspectives Talk by Dr. Gabor Kadar Central European University



Between mid-May and early July 1944, in merely eight weeks, Hungarian and German Nazis deported 437,402 Hungarian Jews – 97 percent of them to Auschwitz-Birkenau. A comparison with other areas in Europe reveals that the Nazis deported more people from Hungary in a span of barely two months than from occupied Western and Northern Europe, the Balkans and the allied states in three years altogether. What was the role of the Hungarian state in one of the most effective deportation campaigns of the Holocaust? The lecture will attempt to answer this question by "zooming out" and embedding the Hungarian story into the wider European picture.
